



Discussions

Student Notes

Discussions are a very important part of your course. They give you the chance to interact with fellow students and your instructor. These instructions will cover both Discussion Forums (graded) and MyCity Cafe (ungraded) discussions. The Discussion Topics are graded and monitored by your instructor, so prepare and submit your answers as you would for any other assignment. The MyCity Cafe Discussion area allows you to discuss the course with your classmates.

This section will take you through the Discussion Forum tab and the steps to view a discussion question create a topic and comment on other students' topics.

<p>Introduction: The Discussion Topics icon.</p> <p>You will find this icon on your Course Outline page.</p>	
<p>To view a discussion question for the first time, open the discussion question from your course outline by clicking on the Discussion Topics icon/ discussion name and then post your first response.</p> <p>Once you have posted this response, you can view and comment on the full forum from the <i>Discussions</i> tab on your Course Outline page.</p>	

Once you open the discussion question, you can view the question/instructions and type your answer in the box at the bottom of the slide. When you are complete, click **Save**. You will now be able to view the full discussion area from the Discussions Tab on your Course Page.

Note: If you are not prepared to answer the question, you can click the *Back* button at the top left of the slide or the "Answer Later" button to go back to the Course Outline and return to this discussion question at a later time.

Once you have entered your answer for a discussion question, you will be able to view/comment on the full discussion area with all student posts under the **Discussions** tab on Course Page. *Make sure to note the name of the discussion question you are working on so you can find it in the Discussion Forum area.*

Once you are on the "Discussions" page, you want to choose the "Discussion Forums" tab. Then you can find the discussion you want to view by selecting it from the list and clicking on it or by typing the name in the search box and selecting it from the list.

When you reach the Discussion Topic you are working on, you can view posts from other students as well as comment on their topics (responses). Click "Add reply" to enter your comment and then click "Send" when you are ready.

If a student post already has comments, you will see "Show replies" and a number depicting how many comments were made on this post. Click Show replies to view other comments and enter your own comment.

Post your discussion topic in the box below. Once complete you can view all posts for this topic under the Discussion Topic tab from your Course Page.

Deming received a BS in electrical engineering from the University of Wyoming at Laramie (1921), an MS from the University of Colorado (1925), and a PhD from Yale University (1928). Both graduate degrees were in mathematics and physics. He had an internship at Western Electric Hawthorne Works in Chicago while studying at Yale. He later worked at the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the Census Department. While working under Gen. Douglas MacArthur as a census consultant to the Japanese government, he was asked to teach a short seminar on statistical process control methods to members of the Radio Corps, at the invitation of Dr. Sarasohn. During this visit he was contacted by JUSE, the society of Japanese engineers, to talk directly to Japanese business leaders, not about Statistical Process Control, but about his theories of management. Returning to Japan for many years to consult. Later, he became a professor at New York University while engaged as an independent consultant in Washington, D.C.
